Mary Corcoran Sessa was an Irish lass from Massachusetts. Born in Westfield, she was welcomed by her parents Joseph and Dorothy Waltner Corcoran in July of 1937. Photographs, scrapbooks and letters lovingly preserved by her mother, reflected how much Mary Margaret was cherished by her parents and large extended Irish family. Although shy and quiet, Mary made childhood friendships that lasted her entire life. Her Catholic faith and education centered around St. Mary's Church in Westfield. She attended and graduated as Valedictorian from her father's alma mater in 1955.
